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BORTH'S ASSEMBLY ROOM

Morfa Borth - the Marsh Harbour.

Now gone. A garage very much the same size stands on the site which is on Chapel Lane behind Pebbles. Built on former garden land behind of Cambrian Terrace.




Borth was very late in having one of these but it was built by 1885 and a company had been formed, the Hon. Secretary was Lieutenant Colonel R. Fielding of Rutland House Cambrian Terrace (Kelly's Directory) It had a stage or platform as in 1889 one April evening an operetta was performed there by a class from the Board School - Borth's 'Top School' at Y Borth (14 April, Cambrian News). Another dramatic performance was held there in aid of the Prevention of Cruelty to Children in July 1906. There was a kitchen area as in 1898 as Miss Lewis the owner of the Glanleri Estate who had Bibury in Cambrian Terrace when staying in Borth, held a tea there for members of St Matthew's Church (Dec 2 Cambrian News). Concerts were held there, as for example one by the Borth Chapel Society in August 1890, and one in aid of funds for street lights in 1911 (Jan 20th.) In 1891 there was a 'Grand Bazaar' held there to raise funds for the church heating and lighting. The Assembly room was also used for a more serious purpose when the Inquest on the murder of Mary Davies was held there on the 4th October 1894.


This was the traditional set up for an Assembly Room. In July 1820 one in Aberystwyth was 45 feet by 25 feet and contained a 'ball and promenade room' and through folding doors a 'card room' 25 feet by 18 feet, a billiard room the same size as the card room, and a 'reading room with newspapers. There was a ball every Tuesday in the season – July to October, a gentleman's subscription was one pound ten shillings, and a lady's one pound. Tea was included. No gentleman in boots was allowed in unless they were 'military'. The ladies drew tickets for places when they came into the room, and they took their places at the bottom after a dance. There was a master of ceremonies. The 'Promenades' were the 1st Wednesday in July at 1 o'clock, and then twice a week during the season. On Wednesdays

a Welsh harpist attended, on Fridays a small military band alternately with a harpist. There would probably have been a platform for the musicians.

There is no mention of 'balls' in Borth's Assembly Room in the newspapers possibly because there was a ballroom and billiard room in the Cambrian Hotel. Borth's Assembly Room was more like a large and convenient public hall. Borth was to have a billiard room much later in an old chapel in the 1920s.



In 1910 the Assembly Room was valued for a tax not levied at three pounds four shillings, gross four pounds and was owned by the Assembly Room Company. It was not considered very valuable, the same as an older two storey house in the High Street such as Pomona.




LEFT The gardens of the Terrace in 1880. The Assembly Room would be tucked into the south western corner - not allocated to a specific Terrace house.
